Mr. Cochran welcomed Mr. Jones to the Board and introduced the members of the Board and liaisons from the Friends and Foundation. Mr. Jones is excited to join the Board and assist the Library with future endeavors.

III. Approval of Today's Agenda

Mr. Laughlin motioned to approve the January 27, 2021 agenda, with an amendment to agenda item IX. Committee Reports: Mr. Archer will provide an update from the Strategic Planning Committee, and Mr. Cochran or Dr. Bartlett will discuss their conversations with Ms. Tucker regarding building maintenance. Ms. MacLennan seconded the motion. The agenda for today's meeting was unanimously approved with the amendments.

IV. Approval of Minutes from Monday, December 16, 2020

Mr. Archer motioned to approve minutes from the December 16, 2020 meeting. Mr. Laughlin seconded the motion. The BOT minutes from December 16, 2020 were unanimously approved.

V. Director's Report - Taneisha Tucker

a. Dr. McCallum

Ms. Tucker acknowledged the passing of former Vestavia Hills mayor, Dr. Charles "Scotty" McCallum. During and after his tenure as mayor, Dr. McCallum actively championed and supported the library.

b. O'Neal Library Extended Hours

O'Neal Library is extending its hours to 10am-6pm, Monday-Friday.

c. Patron Visit Increase

Patron visits have increased with an average of 100 patrons entering per day.

d. Wayne Snider's Retirement

Library Building Engineer, Wayne Snider, is retiring March 31, 2021. Ms. Tucker and Mr. Tackett will begin the search for his replacement by February 1, 2021. The timeline for hiring allows Mr. Snider an opportunity to train the new employee.

e. COVID Vaccinations

Ms. Tucker received a letter from COSTLA (Chief Officers of the State Library Agency) stating that public library employees will be in category 1C for COVID vaccinations.

VIII. New Business

a. Strategic Planning Survey Discussion - Taneisha Tucker

Ms. Tucker sent a proposed survey to BOT members and requested their review and input.

b. LSTA Notice of Intent - Daniel Tackett

Mr. Tackett submitted a Notice of Intent to the Alabama Public Library Service for a \$25,000 LSTA grant that will be used to purchase a new storage area network. If awarded, the grant will be issued in the 2022 fiscal year.

IX. Committee Reports

a. Strategic Planning - Kevin Archer

The Strategic Planning Committee plans to contact other libraries for information on makerspace usage, innovative engagement strategies for the community, and fundraising opportunities. Mr. Archer will send the list of questions the committee has compiled to the Board for review. Ms. Tucker will update the City Council on their plans on February 11, 2021.

b. Facility Renovations - Taneisha Tucker, Larry Cochran, and Jimmy Bartlett

The wood on the exterior of the building requires replacement. Ms. Tucker contacted Lauren Gwaltney, the architect who worked with the library's original architect, Mr. Steve Reeves. Ms. Gwaltney suggested replacing the wood with a metal that resembles wood. This product will withstand the elements far better than wood.

Mr. Reeves is not available to work on this project but provided an estimate of approximately \$250,000-\$300,000. This estimate, which includes scaffolding, architect's fees, materials, and architect plans, is in excess of the \$142,000 currently budgeted in this fiscal year.

This need should be addressed in this fiscal year. The siding has begun to separate from the building but is not a danger to patrons. It is unsightly and will become a bigger problem in the future.

X. Foundation Report - Ms. Clark

The year-end mailer was a successful fundraiser, with donations exceeding the mailer's cost. There is currently over \$100,000 in the Foundation's bank accounts. Ms. Clark wants to establish an endowment but is unsure how to proceed and has asked the Board for suggestions. The applicants who were not chosen to serve on the BOT have expressed interest in joining the Foundation.

X. Friends Report - Ms. Preston

The total balance of the Friends account is \$40,703.67. The only expense the Friends paid this month was Chamber membership dues, about \$125. There was no income from the Bookstore as it remains closed. The Friends hope to reopen the Bookstore by September.

XI. Informational Items

No informational items to discuss.

XII. Adjournment

The BOT meeting was adjourned at 4:54pm. The next BOT meeting is Wednesday, March 10, 2021 at 4pm.

Education Trust Fund Recommendations
Both the Alabama House and Senate have developed their budget for Education Trust
Fund. The bills are HB297 sponsored by Representative Bill Pool and SB189 sponsored by
Senator Arthur Orr.

HB279 and SB189 proposes the following funding for the Alabama Public Library Service,
Homework Alabama, the Supreme Court Library, and the Alabama Virtual Library. The funding
for each of these remains the same as the 2020/2021 budget.
Recommend FY 2021/2022 budget
State Aid to public libraries remains at \$1.13 per capita
Homework Alabama remains at \$295,000
Supreme Court Library remains at \$350,000
Alabama Virtual Library remains at \$3,397,627

Reading Through the Pandemic: Local Librarians Discuss the Importance of Reading and Literary

Trends



In the words of author George Saunders, "Reading is a form of prayer, a guided meditation that briefly makes us believe we're someone else."

Regular reading also provides an escape from where we are.

The Stanford Graduate School of Business recently published an article by Martin J. Smith, in which Stanford business scholar Scotty McLennan discusses the value of literature in times of crisis, including the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Good literature helps us understand good human relations," McLennan states. "It's valuable through its nuances, its twists and turns, its dilemmas, its paradoxes. It helps us see more than is otherwise seen and focus on what ultimately matters."

Reading books, according to research gathered by Healthline.com, strengthens the brain, increases empathy, builds vocabulary, prevents cognitive decline, reduces stress, aids sleep, alleviates depression and lengthens lifespan.

Reading as Therapy

"Reading is definitely therapeutic," said Hoover librarian Justin Rogers. "Not only does it expand your vocabulary and knowledge, but it allows for some healthy escapism."

A good book will take its reader on a journey, Rogers added. For instance now, reading can shift focus from the pandemic and socio-political stressors to the books' main characters and their journeys, their struggles.

Hoover Public Library Director Amanda Borden noted that she typically travels quite a bit, but she wasn't able to for much of 2020.

"Books allowed me to venture to other locations while remaining safe in my home," she said. "I read 109 books in 2020." That's 25% to 30% more than she normally reads.

According to local librarians in the Over the Mountain area, it's all about finding something that interests you. What interests a reader can be a moving target, changing with the environment around them.

Hoover librarian Krysten Griffin said she spoke with a lot of people online who had trouble reading over the past year.

"I did too until I found a genre that really clicked for me," she said. "For whatever reason, fantasy is exactly what I needed right now. It's a genre I have always enjoyed but never really read much of, but about 50% of what I've read over the last four months has been fantasy."

Both during and in the wake of pandemic shutdowns in the spring, library staff had a firsthand view of just how much people needed to read in times of crisis.

Facilities scrambled to organize new curbside services to supply non-digital readers with physical books.

"When we opened for curbside service, we had 250 cars that first day," Borden said.

Upon reopening the Hoover Public Library in July, Borden and her team witnessed people shedding tears of happiness.

The Homewood Public Library team built on the curbside service, offering Bonus Bags filled with books and activities curated by staff based on the patrons' likes and dislikes.

Recommendations and Interests

According to each of the libraries, recommendation requests have been on the rise.

Lifestyle books that focus on baking, knitting, organization and such are increasingly popular since people are sheltering at home and have more time to focus on hobbies and activities.

Staff at the O'Neal Public Library in Mountain Brook noted that they now have a request form on their website, "My Reads," that helps parents connect with a librarian for personalized recommendations for their kids. In addition, their "Shelf Care" page is packed with suggested titles for adults and teens.

Hoover library assistant Samm Hamilton surmises that people are looking for more recommendations because they simply have more time on their hands for reading.

"I helped a sweet gentleman (recently) who specifically wanted to try Faulkner, 'because it's about time and if not now, when?'" said Samm Hamilton, library assistant at Hoover. "I've also helped people put a finger on what exactly it is they like."

What people are looking for during the pandemic varies based on their interests.

Hoover library specialist Pam Bainter found in her interactions at the library and via book groups that what people have been reading during the pandemic has fallen into two distinct categories.

"Those who read for information/understanding seem to gravitate toward history," Bainter said. They are reading to try and understand what is happening, whether that be past pandemics or other times of crisis.

Readers who are looking to escape gravitate toward genres such as travel books, true crime, biography and fiction.

At the Vestavia Hills Public Library, light-hearted books have been the big contender.

"Throughout the pandemic, we have had some patrons say that they specifically are choosing more light-hearted, feel-good books such as romance, chick lit and beach reads," said Vestavia Hills Library in the Forest Deputy Director Daniel Tackett. "These feel-good books allow them to escape, if only for a little while, from the reality of the pandemic and its effects."

According to data collected by Hoover's library staff, fiction was a leader in 2020, especially on digital services.

"We had 70,000 more checkouts of fiction titles in 2020 than in 2019, while nonfiction only increased by around 13,000," Rogers said.

O'Neal children's librarians noted that there has been an uptick in requests for more nonfiction to support at-home learning.

Homewood cited a rise in people searching for more diverse books in response to rising social movements.

"A lot of our patrons are also asking for social justice books," said Judith Wright, Homewood Public Library assistant director and teen librarian. "People have always turned to books during times of uncertainty and we saw that more than ever in 2020."

Leslie West, head of adult services for Homewood's library has noticed a large number of requests for historical fiction, cozy mysteries, beach reads and suspense thrillers. Nonfiction readers have opted for crime, cookbooks and self-help most frequently.

Kids followed the social justice trend, said Laura Tucker, head of children's services for Homewood's library, as well as requesting graphic novels and books about animals, humor and space.

City Discusses Completion of Community Spaces, Other Projects at Planning Session



The bulk of the Community Spaces Plan should be completed by the end of 2021, including the tennis facility at the newly renovated Wald Park.

At its annual strategic planning session on Feb. 11 and 12, the Vestavia Hills City Council verbally agreed to stick with the original plans for the tennis facility, rather than make changes and expand the scope of the project as was previously discussed.

That plan came in large part due to the results of a citizen survey, which asked for the priorities for those who would partake of the facility, and very few people asked the city to prioritize a pro shop and conditioned indoor space, as discussed in the expanded plan.

The base bid for the planned facility is about \$440,000, while the expanded bid was about \$910,00. The project is expected to go to bid in late April, and be completed no later than Thanksgiving, said Ken Upchurch with TCU Consulting, the project managers.

In other Community Spaces Plan news, Upchurch said interior work and some landscaping is being at the new New Merkel House, with an opening planned sometime in March. At Wald Park, a dog park and the tennis facility are the next items slated to be completed, with a playground also currently under construction, Upchurch said. The work at the amphitheater is nearly done, and previously completed projects include the aquatic complex and ball fields, he said.

Work on the future community building has begun, with foundational work being done in mid-February, church said. The building should be completed by the fall, TCU said.

The other remaining Community Spaces project is Crosshaven Drive, with roadway improvements being completed now. Upchurch said his team is aware of the "mess" the project is at the moment, and said at some point, portions of the road will have to be completely shut down to finish improving the road and installing sidewalks.

Other City Projects

Director of Public Services Brian Davis gave an update on a future dog park at the Sicard Hollow Athletic Complex, which should be deliverable by the fall, he said.

City Engineer Christopher Brady gave an update on three traffic improvement projects: Columbiana Road and U.S. 31, Rocky Ridge Road and Dolly Ridge Road, and Blue Lake Drive and Sicard Hollow Road. At the first intersection, Brady said Jefferson County crews are willing to help in constructing improvements, and the work, which will mostly consist of striping and signage, is estimated at costing about \$370,000.

The construction of a turn lane from Rocky Ridge Road onto Dolly Ridge is estimated to cost between \$185,000 and \$220,000, with that cost not including the cost of obtaining right of way or relocating utilities.

At Blue Lake and Sicard Hollow, the city is examining the possibility of constructing a roundabout, though it comes with a high price tag of about \$2.2 million, with the county offering to pay half of that. The council expressed some concern about the possibility of spending that much money, though city engineers said a roundabout presents the safest option due to reduced sight lines and speeding problems at the intersection.

Sidewalk work is largely complete on East Street, as well as Poe Drive, and will soon begin on Mountain View Drive, Brady said. Sidewalks are on pause on Rocky Ridge Road, as the city is coordinating the construction of sidewalks with the improvement project at Dolly Ridge Road. Preliminary design work for Cahaba Heights Road sidewalks is underway.

In addition to improving drainage on Oakview Lane, Kyle Lane, and Southwood Road at Sunset Drive, Brady said the city is working to complete ALDOT-funded projects, as well.

The bid opening for the long-awaited pedestrian bridge project, which would see a pedestrian walkway constructed over U.S. 31 connecting the Vestavia Hills Library in the Forest and Wald Park, was set for Feb. 26, and the city will pay about \$500,000 of the project, plus a potential addition of roughly \$170,000 in utility relocation costs, Brady said.

The city is working to acquire right of way on Massey Road, but no bid date has been set by ALDOT, Brady said. There are 21 different property owners the city is trying to work with to ensure it has the property it needs to rebuild the retaining wall, widen the road on both sides, make improvements and build sidewalks.

The Sicard Hollow Athletic Complex tunnel project is delayed due to utility issues, but Brady said work should be done by summer 2021.

Brady also reminded the council of the city's efforts to pave about seven miles of roadway this year as part of the city's three-year road resurfacing plan, which started in 2019.

Police and Fire

Twenty new police vehicles were recently purchased by the Vestavia Hills Police Department, a major part of the city's fiscal year 2021 budget, and one car a week should be coming in as they get upfitted for service, said Capt. Shane Ware. The cars include an array of technological advancements that make it easier for officers to do their job, officers said during a presentation during the strategic planning session.

Vestavia continues to see a decrease in crime, said Lt. Joe Dease, who reported that only two categories of crime had an increase from 2019 to 2020: robbery (three in 2019 and four in 2020) and theft of vehicle (27 in 2019 and 29 in 2020). All other categories saw a decrease or, in the case of murder and kidnapping, remained at zero. For the second year in a row, the city saw its lowest number ever for burglaries, Dease said.

In addressing the council, Dease said the department is planning on splitting up coverage of Liberty Park into two beats, in order to have better coverage, and cited concerns over longer response times due to the size of Liberty Park, which is roughly the same size as the city of Homewood, as well as safety concerns with officers often having to file reports in their cars.

Chief Dan Rary said due to money saved by more senior officers recently retiring, there should be enough money in the budget to hire four additional officers, on top of the two additional officers whose positions were budgeted for this year, and he asked the council to go ahead and approve that move.

In the Fire Department, Chief Marvin Green also expressed concern about the future coverage of Liberty Park, which continues to grow, and said future development needs for the department include reducing the arrival time of the second and third engine and offsetting additional requirements to maintain a low ISO rating, among other goals. Green also gave an update on the training facility, which is being leased from the county along with the Rocky Ridge Fire District. The facility is mobile, has moveable walls and ventilation props and allows the department to have its own place to train and improve, Green said. The total cost of the project, including the remodeling of the facility, is just under \$600,000.

Finances

City finances are in great shape, Downes said, with increases in both sales tax and ad valorem tax, allowing the city to remain stable despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Downes told the council they may want to consider splitting the city's roughly \$2.8 million surplus between the general fund and capital fund reserves. The surplus currently goes solely to the general fund's unassigned reserves. Splitting it would raise the capital fund reserves from about \$4.3 million to \$5.7 million, while the general fund unassigned reserves would decrease from about \$5 million to \$3.6 million. The move was made last year by the council.

Downes also recommended enacting a 1% cost of living adjustment for city employees this year, something that wasn't done last year.

Lastly, as the Community Spaces Plan comes to a close in the next 12 months, Downes told the council that they may want to consider how they are using the 1 cent additional sales tax revenues that go, right now, to the plan. With sales tax revenues on the rise, Downes said the question of what to do with that money once Community Spaces is finished will continue to come up.

In the finance department, City Finance Director Melvin Turner announced that Assistant Finance Director George Sawaya is planning on retiring at the end of 2022, and the department is working on a succession plan and hopes to have someone in place in time to work with Sawaya for a year before he leaves.

Sanitation Services

After Amwaste took over the city's sanitation contract in October, the city has been very pleased with their service, said City Manager Jeff Downes.

Rick Sweeney with Amwaste said only 80 pickups were missed in January, with 27,000 services each week.

Downes said there is always room for improvement, and the city is evaluating whether to alter routes to be more efficient.

Parks and Recreation

The city's Parks and Recreation Department is getting ready for the new community building and the completion of other Community Spaces projects, improving their software and exploring partnerships to maximize the city's new resources.

With new software, patrons can now check availability of rooms, request facility reservations and sign up for memberships and classes, and the city can track those numbers.

Tonia Whatley with the Convention of Visitors Bureau talked about the possibility of a partnership with the organization to help market the building, which will be one of the largest event spaces in the area at 10,000 square feet. She said the city should be able to reach its goal of having the space rented 45 days a year.

In conjunction with Cinnamon McCulley, the city's communications director, the department is also looking to rebrand in 2021, creating new logos and a new website, helping people take advantage of the new amenities that have come and are coming soon to the city.

McCulley said she'd also like to create a seasonal activity guide that will highlight city amenities and activity options, as well as a book that would highlight the city as a whole.

The city is also considering changing Christmas lights around the city. While the council decides whether to spend the money for the lights, the city is working to fix the streetlights that don't work and improve that infrastructure. For 150 new light fixtures, it would cost \$75,000, and the new lights would be brighter and more updated than the current options.

One option might be to partner with the city of Hoover, which will soon purchase Christmas lights. Hoover Mayor Frank Brocato spoke to the council about possible partnerships in the areas of sanitation and small-cell technology, though nothing specific was agreed upon.

Other City Departments

The Vestavia Hills Library in the Forest is working on a strategic plan, said Director Taneisha Tucker. In preparing a new plan, Tucker and her staff are researching various libraries around the country that are innovative in their approach to serving their communities, she said.

Tucker said she hopes the plan renews excitement and increases the library's patronage. The plan is due to the state by the end of the year.

In the municipal court, Court Director Umang Patel said the department has started using a new credit card processing company, as well as a new kiosk that improves efficiency and limits physical interactions during the pandemic. However, with the courts closed for a while last year, there has been a significant increase in the number of cases handled per week, from 400 this time last year to 700 now, Patel said. Cases have already been assigned out to September 2021, he said.

Patel said he's hopeful with employees set to receive the vaccine March 5 that things will improve and asked the council to consider improving the court's software to help improve service.

Legislative Issues

The council briefly discussed issues that may come up during this year's legislative session, including the possibility of a bill to extend sanitation contracts from three years to five years, which would help cities retire capital contracts over a period of five years, decreasing yearly payments.

The city also plans to keep an eye on how the state handles the Simplified Sellers Use Tax (SSUT), which allows online retailers to opt in to paying a flat 8% sales tax on all online transactions, which is then distributed across the state. There have been calls from some leaders to change the way the money is distributed to counties and cities.

Other legislation that may come up includes whether to legalize gambling and fund casinos, whether to extend the terms of currently elected officials so their term does not end during a national election year, as well as bills dealing with small-cell technology and medical marijuana.

City Clerk Rebecca Leavings announced there was a change in voting locations: Voters who previously voted at Horizon Church will now vote at Shades Mountain Baptist Church, and work is ongoing to find a new location for voters at Town Village.


Anne of Green Gables by Lucy Maud Montgomery





Overall Satisfaction with City Services - 2011 to 2020






Satisfaction With Library in the Forest 2017 vs. 2020





Overall Satisfaction with Various <u>City Services</u> by Major Category - 2020






Q1-09 Satisfaction with overall quality of public library facilities and services




Q14-03 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with programs and services for children 0-12




Q14-05 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with programs and services for adults 20-49


Q14-06 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with programs and services for mature adults, ages 50 and up








Q14-10 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with meeting room rental opportunities






Q14-13 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with passport application processing




Q14-15 Library in the Forest: Satisfaction with marketing of library events and offerings


Q14-16 Library in the Forest during COVID-19 closure: Satisfaction with curbside services


Q14-17 Library in the Forest during COVID-19 closure: Satisfaction with accessibility of library materials


Q14-18 Library in the Forest during COVID-19 closure: Satisfaction with accessibility of programming (on social media or YouTube)



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





Honestly, since the Liberty Park library group disbanded because the leader moved, I don't hear much from anyone in the city (regardless of location) about library services. I am very thankful for the LP book lockers, as I think this at least provides an opportunity to take advantage of physical book library services even though the library is all the way across town from my home.

 I would like to see more (and continued) robust library programming for older ("empty nest") adults. Book clubs, classes, arts and crafts, and social activities are examples. Seniors struggle with isolation, particularly during recent times. Providing activities to keep them active and part of the community will be welcome. Anything that can make it easier for seniors to avail themselves of library activities (transportation coordination, once the senior van is up and running and C-19 restrictions eased, and remote activities at senior centers) should be a priority.

- 2. I would like to see some scheduled activities (similar to what is provided at the main library) at New Merkel senior center once the new one is open. I think sponsoring activities at this venue gives increased access to areas of our city that are further from the main library. Encourage seniors to be your program ambassadors. I am aware Elise Bodenheimer has been active in the Friends of the Library ever since she applied for Library Board and was not selected. I would ask our seniors who are "friends of the library" to tell you how to best reach seniors with information about activities and services.
- 3. I have not visited recently, since Covid-19 hit, because the facility was closed or had limited access and I was unsure of open times, etc. Before that, I did visit regularly, but not frequently. It is not a convenient location for me unless I am at city hall or the school board for a meeting already and happen to drop in for a bit. I used the library locker once before Covid-19 hit, and then understood it was shut down for a period of time and have not tried it again. I buy a lot of digital books or real books online because the library is not close to my home.

I hope this is helpful feedback. I don't hear much about the library from my constituents but did pay attention to our survey results.
